COURSE DESCRIPTION: This is an introductory course in Macroeconomics, which will expose students to useful tools, including problem solving and analytical thinking. Students will learn about how our personal choices affect the economy as a whole. Illustrate demand and supply model, demonstrate aggregate economic activity, unemployment, inflation, savings, investment, monetary policy, fiscal policy, international trade, and public policy.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, you should be able to:

- Describe the basic concepts used in economic analysis.
- Explain how markets work to determine prices and output levels.
- Describe how real GDP, the price level, and the unemployment rate are measured.
- Compare and contrast major theories of the macroeconomics.
- Discuss Federal Reserve and Banking systems.
- Describe fiscal and monetary policy.
- Discuss how foreign exchange markets work.

In addition, the material you would learn in this course should prepare students for further coursework in economics including intermediate macroeconomics.

Student Learning Outcome:

1. Evaluate the interaction between firms and households in a free market economic system.
2. Demonstrate an understanding of macroeconomics principles by answering both qualitative and quantitative questions.
3. Evaluate the major economic variables on the national level, such as inflation, overall employment, growth and international trade.
4. Analysis the fundamental terms and concepts, and ability to interpret and apply the quantitative information to “real world” economic issues.

Prerequisites: **Math 153.** This course is a **3 -units** course that meet GE requirements for Associates Degrees, and transfers to **UC, CSU.**

Required Text book, and other supplies

1. Macroeconomics Principles, Applications, and Tools, 6th Edition. O’Sullivan, Sheffrin/Perez

2. Optional reading: Economics, Newsweek, Walt Street Journals, Business week.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. 2-midterm, and a non-comprehensive final exam.
2. Online, and on campus class participation, current events, and class assessments
3. Homework assignments. (For homework instructions refer to MyEconlab)

Structure of the course:

- This course is a **Hybrid course**. Part of the course instructions delivered online via blackboard, and part delivered on campus class. Power point, lecture notes, and examination are available online via black board.
- Students are required to meet on campus (5- Mondays from 6-8 Pm. for the entire semester). For detailed information/instruction about the hybrid course, refer to the Ohlone class schedule.
- On line class discussions, and on campus class participation are required.
- Home work assignments, must be submitted on “Myeconlab” web page.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS: This course will be available online **24x7** from start to the end of semester. You are not required to be online on a certain time/date **except** on exams, and assignments due dates. Although the class can be entered anytime to work on assessments or meet up with classmate in the chat room, but this class officially held M-Th. that means I will log in to the course M-Th, will post course instructions on the discussion board, and students are expected, and responsible to read my postings, and follow instructions.

2. Perform the assigned readings from the textbook.
3. Complete the required tests and online assignments.
4. Complete the homework assignments. **Refer to “Myeconlab” home page for due dates, and instructions.**

INSTRUCTIONS FOR POSTING MESSAGES ON THE DISCUSSION BOARD.

When you access this class via blackboard for the first time, please do the following:

- (1) click the Discussions tab;
- (2) click the Introductions link;
- (3) click the button, Compose Message; the compose message window will open;

- (4) In the subject line, type in your Last Name followed by the word Introduction. Introduce yourself: tell us about your educational background, work experience, reasons for taking this class, when finished click the Post button. Go back to the Home Page and browse all items.

Method of communication. Use the blackboard e-mail system, and the discussion board for class communication. To send email, click on “messages” for sending email, or click on “discussion” for posting messages.

Discussion. Discussion board is the effective tool of communication for this course; use the discussion board to send messages, post questions about the course contents, and communicate with the professor, and your classmates.

Examination policies and requirements.

Examinations are located on the “Assessments” folder. To access to a test/quiz click on the “Assessment” it will take you to the test/quiz page. **Note: Exams are not available before or after due dates.** All exams are multiple choice questions. You have **2- hours** to complete a test, and **30 minutes** to complete a quiz. All tests **must** be taken between **8:00 am till 11:00 pm** on the scheduled time. Grades will be posted after **11:00 p.m** on the test due date.

Class participations=Business/economics current event discussions. There will be **12** current events required for the entire semester. **The current event topic must be directly related to the economics/business news;** to get full credit on the current event assignment you must follow the current event posting requirements.

A) Select a business/economics article from a reliable source, summarize the article, include your comments about the article, and post them on the discussion board. You must also reply to a classmate’s comments.

B) Each current event must be numbered such; (current event #1). Required **2-3** paragraphs.

C) Sources of the article such as; name, issue, date, and the URL.

D) Post the current event on the discussion board; be sure to post them on the “**current event**” folder.

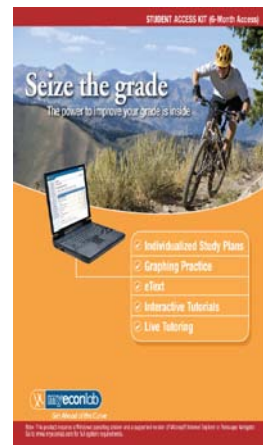
E) Current events are due on Wednesdays. You may submit the current event before due dates but not later than due date. **No grade on late assignment.**

Homework instructions/requirements.

Refer to “MyEconLab” home page for homework assignments instructions. You may submit the homework earlier than due date but not later than due date).

No grade on late homework.

This course is enhanced by “MyEconLab” software, which is included with your textbook. The homework assignments will be computer graded as soon as they are completed. In addition to proving worked out examples, animations, and valuable tools provided to explain how to solve homework problems. The software also offers guided solutions to any of the problem that prove to be a complex/hard problem.

Steps to Register.
