Focus Topic: What are we really testing?

Now that all courses are fully online, the fear that students are going to cheat (rather, more students will cheat) seems to be a pervasive topic around the proverbial water cooler. The fear of cheating has been parlayed by predatory companies into 'video proctoring solutions' that they claim reduce the incidence of cheating...for a cost. For a fee, they will monitor the eye movements and keystrokes of every student taking your test and they will flag those that *may* be cheating. When a student is looking down, are they looking at a cheat sheet or are they looking at the keyboard? When they look up, are they looking at notes they have attached to their computer? Seems we might be assessing the student's ability to be creative and inventive more than the ability to recall information.



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We have an opportunity to rethink our assessment practices and ask ourselves if there is a better way to evaluate a student's understanding of a topic and the nuances involved with the application of said topic. This [article by Wade Tyler Millward](#) proposes that "what really helps deter cheating is a culture of academic integrity and consistent reminders to students on when assistance is allowed for exams and assignments, and what specific types of assistance are allowed". He further questions the value of testing memorization skills and argues that information literacy is actually more important.

Notes from Mary

When you decided on a teaching as a career, did you think “Wow, I can’t wait to grade students?” I doubt it. When you define teaching and learning is grading a central theme? I hope not and I encourage you to consider why that is and how we can maintain our focus on teaching and learning and align our grading practices accordingly. Here are three resources you may find helpful in reflecting and adjusting your practices in this time of change.

- *Grading for Equity: What It Is, Why It Matters, and How It Can Transform Schools and Classrooms* by Joe Feldman (2019) talks about the history of grading in US schools, primarily K-12 schools in Oakland, CA. The second half of the book is dedicated to 19 grading practices aimed at achieving accurate, bias-resistant, and motivational equitable grading.
- [Equity in STEM](#) is a webinar in which three CCC faculty share assessments they've used in their classrooms to reduce barriers and improve outcomes for all students. If you don't have time to view the entire webinar, I strongly recommend that you cue up minute 43 as Dr. Rob Rabulcaba shares his experiences in working with Umoja students at San Diego City College.
